What year did I graduate? 1997

How did FRA prepare you for college and life?

Because False River Academy was such a close-knit school, being part of a team was a way of life. This ranged from decorating lockers for the football team to building prom our junior year. We learned the importance of honoring obligations to our classmates and our teachers, and we discovered we could rely on support from others. I can remember being a part of yearbook and



each person was assigned pages to make a collaborative unit. That was such a great experience, because not only did we work together to achieve a common goal, but I was able to interact with students in other grades and, as a result, my FRA support group extended beyond just the other students in my class. Practically everyone on staff served as both a mentor and a mentee, so everyone had the chance to both assist and to lead.

I sometimes think, had I been at a much larger school, I would've had more of a tendency to blend in with the crowd. Because of my FRA experience, it never occurred to me to shy away from volunteering in class, sharing my thoughts, or helping a classmate even when I was attending those large LSU classes. Like most small schools, teachers and fellow students become family. I remember talking to every single person in my class. There wasn't anyone with whom I didn't interact. Today, I have good relationships with the FRA faculty and staff--past and present--as well as my classmates, and even my classmates' families. My closest friends from school are still my closest friends today. I am in touch with these friends every single day. I don't recall a life without these people in it, and they wouldn't be part of my life if not for FRA. To have such a support system come from experiences that began when I was five years old is truly amazing!

What would you tell a student or family who is considering an education at FRA? My best advice to a family looking for an academic home is to consider what you want for your children. Do you want them to feel a part of something special? Do you want them to get an education--the same education that has proven, time and again, to produce successful, conscientious members of society?
